In the Fullness of Time (Turnpike Wesleyan - December 20, 2020)

Scripture Text: Galatians 4:4-7

But when the fullness of the time had come, God sent forth His Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, that we might receive the adoption as sons. And because you are sons, God has sent forth the Spirit of His Son into your hearts, crying out, "Abba, Father!" Therefore, you are no longer a slave but a son, and if a son, then an heir of God through Christ.

Introduction

A lady on an elevator, expressing her frustration with all the Christmas shopping and errands, was overheard to say, "Who ever thought up Christmas? We ought to catch this guy and <u>hang</u> him up somewhere!" From the back of the elevator a voice spoke up, "Don't worry, mama, we already <u>crucified</u> Him!"

Galatians chapter 4:4-7 is actually a Christmas text. Even the Galatians needed a reminder about the real meaning of Christmas. They were turning from the Gospel of God's *grace* to the bondage of the *law*.

It is about the **Advent** of a Savior (verse 4)!

First, we see his <u>Divine</u> Origin. The Bible says, "But when the fullness of the time was come, God sent forth his Son." You see Jesus had always existed with the Father. John says, "In the beginning was the <u>Word</u>, and the <u>Word</u> was with God and the <u>Word</u> was God" (John 1:1).

In love for humanity, the Father sent the Son. In love for the Father and humanity, Jesus willingly went!

We see His full <u>humanity</u>. "Born of a woman." While Jesus was fully <u>divine</u> in origin, He was likewise fully <u>human</u>. He entered the world just as you and I entered the world.

Christmas is also about the <u>Acceptance</u> of Sinners (verse 5).

Verse 5 begins with the word "<u>To</u>." To do what? Paul is now going to tell us why Christmas came, why Christ was born, why he lived under the law.

He tells us there is a twofold purpose, one building upon the other. First, to bring *redemption*! To *redeem* means to set free, to purchase one's freedom.

Knowing the rules and trying to keep the rules in our own power has always resulted in *failure*. We need something more than a written moral code. We need a change of *heart*.

We must also be set free from the law because the law carries with it a <u>curse</u>. To do one thing <u>immoral</u> in thought, word, or deed; in omission, as well as commission brings upon us the curse.

He freed us from the curse of the law by becoming a <u>curse</u> for us. He removed our curse as He suffered, bled, and died on the cross. And for what purpose did He do all of this?

That we might receive the <u>adoption</u> of sons and daughters. He set us free from the curse so that He could place us in His <u>family</u>, so that you and I could become adopted sons and daughters of God, bearing all rights and privileges as natural sons and daughters. "Oh, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us that we should be called the sons of God." He has taken us from slavery to <u>sonship!</u>

Finally, Christmas is about the Assurance of God's Spirit (verse 7).

Once again, the divine takes up residence in the <u>human</u>. "He sent forth the Spirit of his Son into your heart." God lives in our innermost being. A <u>personal</u> Christmas.

This is also the heart cry of the child of God. A cry of trust, a cry of <u>closeness</u>, a cry of kinship, a cry of <u>worship</u> and a cry of love.

In our heart of hearts, God is not <u>distant</u>. In our heart of hearts, He's Abba, <u>Daddy</u>. Has this been your experience?
